Reading

By the end of year two, to reach the expected standard, children will be able to;

Read most words accurately in an age expected book. (reading at approximately 90 words per minute)

Read words with common suffixes and most common exception words.

Check that what they are reading makes sense and self correct when needed.

Answer questions that include retrieval and inference.

Explain what has happened in their reading.

How to help at home -

Read daily and support fluency.

Discuss what is being read and also in stories that you read which are beyond what the child can read.

Writing

By the end of year two, to reach the expected standard, children will be able to;

Write narratives about personal experiences both real and fiction.

Use full stops, capital letters and question marks correctly and consistently.

Use the present and past tense correctly.

Use co-ordination and sub-ordination to join ideas - or, and, but, because, if.

Spell the Year 1 and 2 common exception word list and use this in their writing.

Use their phonic knowledge to spell unfamiliar and new words.

Form capital letters correctly and make them bigger than lower case letters.

Use spacing between words.

Form lower case letters correctly.

How to help at home -

Ensure that when your child is doing their homework, that they are using the correct letter formation and punctuation.

Ensure that spellings are being supported.

Maths

Read and write numbers to 100.

Partition numbers - knowing how many tens and ones a number has - the value of each digit.

Add and subtract 2 digit numbers using efficient strategies.

Recall number bonds fluently and associate these with more complex ones
(if $7 + 3 = 10$ then $37 + 3 = 40$)

Recall multiplication and division facts for 2, 5, 10 and use them to solve problems.

Identify simple fractions of shapes or numbers - halves, quarters and thirds.

Use coins to make amounts.

Read the time to the nearest 15 minutes.

Name and describe 2D and 3D shapes including the number of sides, vertices, edges, faces and lines of symmetry.

The SAT Assessments

At the end of Year 2, children will take assessments in:

Reading

Maths

Grammar, punctuation and spelling

All assessments will take place in May.

These assessments, along with a collection of their writing will support us in making judgements as to whether individual children are working towards, at or beyond the expected levels in Year 2.

Reading

The Reading Test consists of two separate papers:

- **Paper 1** – consists of a combined reading prompt and answer booklet. The paper includes a list of useful words and some practice questions for teachers to use to introduce the contexts and question types to pupils. The test takes approximately 30 minutes to complete, but is not strictly timed.
- **Paper 2** – consists of an answer booklet and a separate reading booklet. There are no practice questions on this paper. Teachers can use their discretion to stop the test early if a pupil is struggling. The test takes approximately 40 minutes to complete, but is not strictly timed.
- The texts will cover a range of poetry, fiction and non-fiction.

Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.

Within the assessment, the spelling words are read out to the children to fill into the gaps within the sentences. In this example, the missing spelling words are: **pack**, **sky**, **shell** and **baby**.

Maths example question

Children will sit two tests: **Paper 1 and Paper 2:**

- **Paper 1: Arithmetic** – lasts approximately 20 minutes (but this is not strictly timed). It covers calculation methods for all operations.
- **Paper 2: Reasoning** – lasts for approximately 35 minutes, which includes time for five aural questions. Pupils will still require calculation skills and questions will be varied including multiple choice, matching, true/false, completing a chart or table or drawing a shape. Some questions will also require children to show or explain their working out.

Children are not allowed to use counting apparatus in these tests such as number lines or 100 squares.


